



Step 1: Complete your SPACECAT analysis of the provided text.

Step 2: Log on to Paper and enter a Live Chat, ask the tutor for feedback on your analysis. Take notes as you work with your tutor.

<p>SPEAKER: Who is the speaker/writer? What do we know about them? What can you tell or what do you know about the speaker that helps you understand the point of view expressed?</p>		
<p>PURPOSE: What is the speaker/writer hoping to accomplish? What is the reason behind this piece? What do they want the audience to do after having listened?</p>		
<p>AUDIENCE: Who is the speaker/writer trying to reach? How do we know? Do they indicate a specific audience? What assumptions exist in the text about the intended audience?</p>		
<p>CONTEXT: What is the time and place of this piece? What is happening in the world as it relates to the subject of the speech or the speaker/writer?</p>		

<p>EXIGENCE: What was the spark or catalyst that moved the speaker/writer to act/write? How did that event impact the speaker/writer?</p>		
<p>CHOICES: What are the rhetorical choices that the speaker/writer makes in the speech? Think about overall structure, devices, diction, syntax, etc.</p>		
<p>APPEALS: Which of the three rhetorical appeals (ethos, logos, pathos) are present in the text? Where? Why?</p>		
<p>TONE: What is the speaker/authors attitude toward the subject? Is the tone the same throughout the whole piece? Where does it shift? What evidence is there to demonstrate the tone?</p>		

Remember: rhetorical analysis requires you to read and understand what matters about a text (SPACE) and comment on what specific features make it rich or effective (CAT).
